Public Safety Spectrum Trust Releases Revised Bidder Information

WASHINGTON, D.C. – November 30, 2007 – Today, the Public Safety Spectrum Trust Corporation (PSST) released its revised Bidder Information Document. This document responds to requests in advance of the Federal Communications Commission's (FCC) 700 MHz spectrum auction from prospective D Block bidders seeking additional information regarding the PSST's expectations and preferences for a shared public safety-commercial network. The document released today includes feedback provided from potential D Block bidders and others since the release of the first Bidder Information Document on November 15, 2007. Chief Harlin McEwen, Chairman of the PSST, said, "We're pleased that a number of potential bidders have reviewed the Bidder Information Document and have provided comments back to the PSST." He added, "Although this is the final document we will share with potential bidders before the start of the auction, we encourage all parties to continue contacting us to share their thoughts and ideas on the shared public safety broadband network."

On November 19, 2007, the PSST was designated by the FCC to be the Public Safety Broadband Licensee (PSBL) in accordance with its Second Report and Order governing the 700 MHz band. Following completion of the 700 MHz spectrum auction, a network sharing agreement will be negotiated between the PSBL and the D Block auction winner, which will detail the parameters of their relationship, as well as the provisions, capabilities and operations of their shared wireless broadband network.

The PSST Board of Directors is comprised of representatives of the following organizations: the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO); the Association of Public-Safety Communications Officials-International (APCO); the Forestry Conservation Communications Association (FCCA); the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP); the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC); the International City/County Management Association (ICMA); the International Municipal Signal Association (IMSA); the National Association of State Emergency Medical Services Officials (NASEMSO); the National Emergency Number Association (NENA); the National Governors Association (NGA); and the National Sheriffs' Association (NSA). On November 9, 2007, the FCC issued a Public Notice announcing the selection of the American Hospital Association (AHA), the National Fraternal Order of Police (NFOP), the National Association of State 9-1-1 Administrators (NASNA), and the National Emergency Management Association (NEMA) as the four at-large members to the PSBL's Board of Directors.

About the PSST

The PSST, a non-profit corporation organized under the laws of the District of Columbia, is the Public Safety Broadband Licensee (PSBL) holding an FCC license for public safety spectrum in the upper 700 MHz band designated for nationwide wireless broadband use. The PSST's mission is to provide national public safety leadership an organizational structure through which decisions can be made to guide the construction and operation of this interoperable nationwide broadband network via a public safety-commercial partnership, ensuring the communications requirements of the public safety community are met.
